SAWUBONA!

An African greeting helps youth in Watts - Can it help all of us?



When Orland Bishop says, "I see you," he's really saying much more than that. Behind the Zulu greeting, sawubona, literally translated as "we see you," there's a wisdom Bishop is sharing with disenfranchised youth in LA, and it might be what we all need to guide our world into a healthier future.

"Seeing you is a dialog," explains Bishop, a mentor and community leader from Watts. "It is an invitation to give each other what's needed to enhance life. It asks, "Why are we meeting now?" "What has this moment of time given us to do?"

Born in Guyana - a country populated in part by former slaves - Bishop's family moved to LA when he was a teenager. He studied African spiritual literature in his early twenties, and later travelled to Africa for spiritual training.

"The 'seeing' of Sawubona is almost the same as 'evoking'. It's a call to awareness." Bishop tells me. Sawubona is also a "recalling" of the deepest destiny of the people who are meeting, as well as the destiny of all that is included in that meeting - the land, the country, spirit guides, and the time in which the meeting takes place.

"And the response is Yabo, 'Yes, we see you,'" continues Bishop. "Because seeing is a dialog - this Yes is an acknowledgement and recognition that the seeing is a mutual gift from one human being to another so we can be in relationship for a greater task."

Something important to tell you: Shade Tree Multicultural Foundation, Bishop's non-profit based in Watts, facilitates sawubona through formal meetings that bring people together in support of their deepest potential. They call these meetings, Indaba.

"Indaba is a process through which we convey a message, and awaken the person's capacity to internalize and cognize their destiny. Indaba is a Zulu word meaning, literally, 'I have something important to tell you.'" Bishop himself mentors somewhere between twenty and thirty individuals - talking to ten or fifteen on a weekly basis - some daily if they are struggling with any number of crises from having just had a baby, needing a treatment program, getting arrested, or finding jobs.

Shade Tree organizes weekly meetings across LA, and helps organize annual retreats for young men. Indaba offers youth community, which immediately takes away one of the needs that drives them to join gangs. "Statistically, only 2 percent of those in gangs are violent," says Bishop. "The majority are in it for connectedness. When we work with gang intervention - its not to take people out of relationship with each other. This structure could serve a higher purpose if youth become more self-conscious."

“Our intention is not to correct the mistakes of youths at risk,” he continues. “That happens...but the aim is to support the person becoming self-aware. We strengthen their capacity to feel the destiny within them, rather than respond to the fatalistic draw of impulses that do not support their development.”

But it’s not easy for Bishop – and it shouldn’t be easy for any of us – that when young people begin to wake up to their deeper purpose in life there are still so few social systems in place to support them.

“They find their sense of purpose – that’s their responsibility,” says Bishop. “But whether the culture can give them meaningful work and ways they can fulfill their purpose – that’s another question.”

Our society’s failure is not just limited to the young people in Watts. We’ve all failed to understand our deepest human nature and our responsibilities to life. This is the call from behind our recent economic collapse, says Bishop. “When people pursue self-interest to the degree we have seen – it divides everything to such finite levels that there’s no sense of wholeness. There is a loss of collective purpose in light of collective self interest.”

“We have failed to provide the developmental support for what this generation needs,” he continues. “We created a working world in which they produced toxicity for the planet. Now, the very things we have created for our work have led to the collapse of systems - including the natural world, our economic system, economies of other countries, and our individual development.”

The solution? Sawubona, which calls forth the best of us all: “Our generation holds a tremendous capacity for philanthropy – which means to love the future.” Bishop says. “And the present global crisis is putting us in touch with that capacity more directly – global warming requires us to love things that are not tangible – like nature and the spirit of the earth.”

Orland Bishop will be bringing this wisdom in person to cities on the West Coast as a special guest speaker in an event sponsored by the Global Oneness Project called – *The New Narrative: Local Voices for a Global Future*. This free, multi-media event is coming to Eugene and Portland on May 7th and 8th. The local community is invited to participate in a pre-event reception, film screening and café-style conversations to exchange ideas, foster relationships, and strengthen the changes already taking place in the community. THINKING OF THE HEART AS AN ORGAN OF PERCEPTION FOR DEVELOPMENT AND METAMORPHOSIS
THEME OF THE YEAR 2009 / 2010

The theme of evolution is present everywhere this year. The occasion is the commemoration of the anniversary of Charles Darwin’s book *The Origin of Species* and his birthday 200 years ago. To begin with, we associate Darwinism in an anthroposophical context with the

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frightening battle of existence and a materialistic world view. Conversely, his insight into natural evolution was to Rudolf Steiner one of the three conditions for the appearance of modern spiritual science (Notes for Eduard Schuré, Sept 1907 from the so called "Barr document", GA 262 - Rudolf Steiner and Marie Steiner-von Sivers: Correspondence and Documents 1901-1925). Further, Rudolf Steiner speaks in his lecture of 1913 about "a deeper understanding of Christianity that lies in Darwinism" and that "in our time the Darwinistic impulses are born out of the Christ impulse" (GA 148, *The Fifth Gospel*). We would like to take this anniversary as an opportunity to propose a deepening of the theme of evolution. In addition, we want to advance the idea that the many controversial thoughts regarding this theme living in our culture today can be complemented by Anthroposophy.

There is hardly a subject in Anthroposophy that does not include the theme of evolution, from the development towards a free human being in the great presentation about the evolution of man and the world to Rudolf Steiner's last great work, the founding of the Free School of Spiritual Science. Ultimately it is all about evolution and self development, one cannot exist without the other! For that reason it is noteworthy that the modern idea of evolution only came about in the late 18th century through Johann Gottfried Herder, Johann Wolfgang Goethe and others.

Before this time the word evolution was understood as the unfolding of something that was already there, in other words, predestined in the original sense of the word. Now it is about a striving to become different, the achievement of something new that was not already there. This is the reason why Goethe avoided the old word as much as possible. This new concept of evolution is the one that Darwin picked up on to understand how new species come about in the earth evolution. The thought of evolution taken in this way certainly belongs to the great achievements of post Christian times.

In recent years the themes of the year were connected with the thinking of the heart. When you try to observe how you take in and think about evolution or metamorphosis, you can discover that much of what Rudolf Steiner describes about the thinking of the heart (March 30, 1910, GA 119, *Macrocosm and Microcosm*) relates to it. Thinking about evolution is not a logical cause and effect but a sculptural participation that ends with insight into the relationships under consideration. You can experience this in a simple sequence of leaves. In this way we are able to connect with the larger

question of evolution. We mention two more questions here.

If you have an encompassing view of evolution everything can become different, and we know well that Rudolf Steiner also describes the evolution of spiritual beings. This means that nothing remains the same. Then again one can only speak of evolution when something remains the same, identical with itself. How could one otherwise recognize in the new phase that which is evolving? How could one otherwise speak in the Saturn state about the germs of human beings. Rudolf Steiner discusses this question from various points of view in the lectures Evolution, Involution and Creation from Nothing, June 17 1909, GA 107 (*Spiritual-Scientific Knowledge of the Human Being*) and in the lecture Polarity of Duration and Evolution, September 15, 1918, GA 184 - *The Polarities of Duration and Development in the Life of the Human Being. The Cosmic Pre-History of Humanity*.

A completely different aspect opens up when you look to Darwin for the origin of the thought struggle of existence. Darwin describes how the social scientist [Thomas] Maltus inspired him with that thought. Maltus had observed in the early 19th century something similar in the capitalistic English industrial society. Thus the thought was not derived from nature but from human behavior. And later, in the 20th century, the thought was reversed to justify the worst human behavior in the sense that it was only natural that the fittest would survive. You also find a connection between social science and natural science with Rudolf Steiner, but reversed: that from the natural sciences we learn and practice new ways of thinking which can lead to formative ideas that are fruitful in the social realm. Rudolf Steiner talks about this connection in the opening cycle in the First Goetheanum: *Boundaries of Natural Science*, GA 322.

With all that has been said here, a theme clearly comes to light that penetrates the whole of anthroposophy regarding the concept of evolution. The future of evolution depends on how human beings give it form out of freedom! This thought about evolution is worthwhile when it finds entrance into our present culture.

FOUNDATION STONE EURYTHMY IN PORTLAND

The world of eurythmists and speakers is fortunate in having been given a legacy of specific forms for texts and music created by Rudolf Steiner. These go from Bach, Beethoven through Goethe, Shakespeare and many, many others. I have found that most Eurythmists hold in special reverence the forms given for the *Calendar of the Soul*. Each is a world of discovery that only grows in value over time. The same is true but even more so with the forms for the Foundation Stone Meditation. Having lived in Europe for 16 years we took being able to see the Foundation Stone in Eurythmy as a normal part of Anthroposophical Culture. This has not been true in North America unless you happen to be in Spring Valley or at a conference in which it was presented. I know Eurythmists who have never seen it presented.

It is with this in mind and the potential for the Foundation Stone Meditation as a refounding of the Mysteries in our time that I undertook through the Council of Anthroposophic Organizations (CAO) to try and make this particular work more accessible for our communities. It has taken 3 years of preparation to come to this next phase of this work. We have had workshops across the continent with Eurythmists who have been presenting the Foundation Stone for the past 25 years. Groups of Eurythmists now exist in different parts of the country who have undertaken to prepare the Foundation Stone in their local community. It takes 12 Eurythmists to present the entire work. The first 3 panels by one group of 6, the 4th panel a different group of 6. In order to accomplish this a group of Eurythmists have been working in the San Francisco Bay area on the first 3 panels, having done the 4th panel in previous years and the Group in Portland are preparing the 4th Panel. Mollie Amis has been coming to work with us for the past 2 years.

The preparation of a purely artistic piece, while similar in our art form, is not sufficient with this particular work. Here we must not only accomplish facility with the forms and gestures but a living relationship to the inner qualities that belong to each panel to the best of our abilities. It is the inner side of this preparation that makes this such a slow process. We will offer the entire Foundation Stone with form, gesture, colors, and lighting all from indications by Rudolf Steiner.

Our presentation in June at the AWSNA conference in Portland is a statement in time of how far we have come presenting a work of such depth and magnitude. When talking with those who have worked on this piece for decades the conversation usually moves towards what is still being learned and understood.

Our hope is that for the audience, the experiencing of the Foundation Stone Meditation through art will further fructify the striving of those who continue on the Anthroposophical path.



Dr. Virginia Sease was born in Pennsylvania. Through her high school German teacher, she discovered Anthroposophy. Parallel to a B.A. degree in German literature at Douglas College of Rutgers University she studied singing in New York City. After a Fulbright Scholarship study at the University of Tübingen and the Waldorf Teachers Seminar in Stuttgart, Germany, she was a Class Teacher at Highland Hall Waldorf School then in North Hollywood. In 1968 she received a Ph.D. degree in German literature from the University of Southern California. From 1967 to 1974 she was Assistant Professor of German Literature at Occidental College and worked simultaneously to help to establish the Waldorf Institute of Southern California. She took a Class through eighth grade at Highland Hall in Northridge from 1974 to 1983. During this time she served on the Western Regional Council and from 1981-1984 on the National Council of the Anthroposophical Society in America. In 1984 Virginia Sease became a member of the Executive Council (Vorstand) of the General Anthroposophical Society at the Goetheanum and moved to Dornach, Switzerland. From 1991 to 2001 she also was the leader of the Section for the Arts of Eurythmy, Speech and Music. In addition to her Vorstand work she is responsible for the Anthroposophical Studies Program in English at the Goetheanum since October 2001.



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
